

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public domain – the state of belonging or being available to the public as a whole, especially through not being subject to copyright or other legal restrictions

> The copyrighted material is so old that it is now in the **public domain**.

possession is nine-tenths of the law – ownership is easier to maintain if one has possession of something, or difficult to enforce if one does not

During the legal dispute our lawyers asserted that possession is ninetenths of the law.

trademark (as a verb) – provide with a trademark
